
The Minister of Education, Adamu Adamu, was quoted to have said this at a policy meeting at JAMB headquarters, according to the weekly bulletin of the board released by JAMB's Head of Information and Media, Dr. Fabian Benjamin last Monday.

Adamu, who was represented by Permanent Secretary, Federal Ministry of Education, Architect Sonny Echono, said, "As a demonstration of our resolve, I have directed JAMB to bring forward for appropriate sanctions, the list of all institutions involved in the violation of the directive of government which was personally conveyed by me at the 2018 policy meeting at Gbongan, Osun State.

"The ministry is very resolute that

heads of such institutions will be held personally responsible, either in or out of office. As such, if we are to sanitise our moulding the character of future generations."

Adamu said, "Any institution that issue admission letters to candidates outside CAPS will be punished for such gross indiscipline and fraud."

JAMB Registrar, Prof Is-haq Olovede said for the 2021/22 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination, the board would

be introducing two new subjects - Computer Studies and Physical and Health Education.

This will bring the total number of UTME subjects to 25. Prof. Oloyede added that 956, 809 admission spaces in 962 tertiary institutions in the country and about 600, 000 had been filled.


ES Interacts With Promoters of Proposed Private Universities

TETFUND to Takeover National Library Project

he Federal Government has approved the takeover of the financing of the National Library project by the Tertiary Education Trust Fund, (TETFUND), which by current evaluation required over 50 billion naira for its completion.

Speaking in Abuja last week, when the Nigerian Library Association, (NLA) led by its President, Professor Innocent Ekoga, paid a working visit to the Ministry, the Permanent Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Education, Arch. Sonny Echono, said the critical step being taken by government was meant to reposition library services in the Nigerian education sector for effective service delivery.

Arch. Echono recalled that work on the National Library had been stalled for years due to inadequate funding, adding that efforts to get the private sector to complete the project have not yielded results.

On his investiture with an award by the Association, Arch. Echono said he was

humbled and elated to be honoured by such a reputable Association, describing the award as a great privilege for him. The Permanent Secretary dedicated the prestigious award to Education Minister, Adamu Adamu and the Minister of State for Education, Hon. Chukwuemeka Nwajuiba, respectively.

Earlier in his remarks, President of the Association, Prof. Innocent Ekoga, expressed profound appreciation to the Buhari Administration, maintaining that completion of the National library would bring honour and pride to all Nigerian librarians as well as provide the much needed reservoir for Nigerian researchers, students, and the generality of the reading public.

He noted that the investiture of the Service Award on the Permanent Secretary was the highest honour ever bestowed on a non-librarian by the Association. He also revealed that the investiture was the seventh of its kind by the Association in the last four decades.

Prof. Olatunji-Bello Emerges LASU Vice-Chancellor

he eight months leadership gap which engulfed the Lagos State University, Ojo, has finally abated, with the announcement by the Lagos State Governor Babajide SanwoOlu of the appointment of Professor Ibiyemi Olatunji-Bello as the ninth substantive Vice-Chancellor of the State University.

Prior to her latest appointment, she headed the University's Directorate of Advancement. She also served as Acting Vice-Chancellor for 10 months within the period of January-October,

2011 and emerged as the second female ever to occupy the post in the institution. The first was Prof. Jadesola Akande, who was the second VC of the 36-year old institution from 1989 to 1993.

It would be recalled that the tenure of the eight sustentative Vice-Chancellor of the University, Prof. Olanrewaiu Adigun Fagbohun had ended on the 11th of January, 2021. However, crisis trailed the selection of a Vice-Chancellor to succeed Prof. Fagbohun.

Amid the crisis that trailed the selection process, Governor Sanwo-Olu set up a special visitation panel. As part of the panel mandate was to investigate the issues delaying the VC selection process. The Professor Bamitale Omole-led panel in its report had counseled the Governor to order fresh selection process for a substantive VC.

The Governor also dissolved the Prof. Nurudeen Ninalowo-led Governing Council on the recommendation of the panel. He then appointed a veteran accountant, Sir David Olabanji Sunmoni as the new Pro-Chancellor and chairman of the Council charged with an urgent responsibility to activate the process for selection of a substantive VC.

The new Vice-Chancellor emerged who is the wife of the State Commissioner for Environment and Water Resources, Mr. Tunji Bello, a former Editor of THISDAY.

The government in a statement by the State Commissioner for

Information and Strategy, Mr. Gbenga Omotoso explained that Prof. Olatuni-Bello was appointed following recommendation by the Joint Committee of Council and Senate of LASU in accordance with the LASU Law, Cap 169 Vol. 7 Laws of Lagos State.

Mrs. Olatunji-Bello assumed duty as the first Professor of Physiology in LASU College of Medicine on the 2nd of October 2007, after rising through the ranks from Assistant Lecturer (1988 to 1991) to become Associate

Professor in 2005, at the College of Medicine. University of Lagos, Idi-Araba.

In the year 2012, she attended the Course 34 of the National Institute of Policy and Strategic Studies, Kuru, the highest policy advisory body of the federal government, as a nominee of the National Universities Commission.

A member of the National Institute (mni), Prof. Olatuni-Bello holds a Fellowship Award of the Physiological Society of Nigeria and was also appointed a Fellow of the Environmental Toxicology and Pollution Mitigation in the year 2019.

Prof. Olatunji-Bello as well as two other candidates, Professor Omotayo R. Awofolu and Professor Senapon Bakare was recommended for the position in order of ranking respectively.

Meanwhile, the process of selecting a substantive Vice-Chancellor for LASU commenced with advertisements for the vacant position in three national dailies on Friday, July 30th, and Friday 13th August, 2021, respectively.

DOCTOR OF PHARMACY (PHARM. D) PROGRAMME IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES

The attention of the National Universities Commission has been drawn to the anomaly identified with the Bachelor of Pharmacy (B. Pharm) and Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm. D) programmes in some Nigerian Universities.

The Executive Secretary has therefore directed that I convey to the Vice-Chancellors of Nigerian Universities as follows:

- 1. The B. Pharm and Pharm. D are two separate degrees programmes awarded in the Nigerian University System. The duration for the award of the B. Pharm degree is 5 academic sessions and 6 academic sessions for Pharm.D through the UTME entry mode. Prior to 2015, Universities have been awarding the B. Pharm which is still obtainable and approved by the NUC. However, in a bid to expand the Pharmacy profession to incorporate pharmaceutical care and accommodate clinical demand within the Nigerian educational system, the Pharm. D programme was introduced.
- 2. The Philosophy behind the establishment of Pharm.D programme in Nigerian Universities is

"to provide students with a broad balanced foundation in all the areas of Pharmaceutical Knowledge to further equip them with the ability to apply Pharmaceutical knowledge in health care delivery system; acquire professional skills to identify and resolve drug related problems and to impact to the students, a comprehensive knowledge of Pathophysiology, Therapeutics, Pharmacokinetics and Toxicology among several other aims and objectives".

- 3. To this end, it is necessary to clarify to all Nigerian Universities that;
 - B. Pharm and Pharm. D are the two distinct degrees awarded under the Pharmacy discipline and not to be interchanged;
 - B. Pharm and Pharm. D are both undergraduate programmes; ii.
- B. Pharm does not serve as a bridge to the award of Pharm. D; iii.
- Conversion programmes or top-up aimed at upgrading B. Pharm to Pharm.D is not iv. approved by the Commission; and
- 4. In view of the foregoing and for the avoidance of doubts, it is illegal for any University to run conversion programmes from B. Pharm to Pharm. D.
- 5. The table below shows the Universities the National Universities Commission has granted approval to run the Pharm D. program.

NOTICE OF ILLEGAL UNIVERSITY OPERATIONS OF AL-NAHDA INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY IN NIGERIA

The illegal AL-NAHDA Satellite, campus is located adjacent to the Zamfara State House of Assembly and has a Polaris Bank Account No. 4091289549, through which payment for its fees in Nigeria are made.

Further investigations by the NUC into the Operation of AL-NAHDA International University revealed that in Niger Republic, the University has campuses in Niamey and Maradi.

The NUC is, by this notice, alerting the general public to the Illegal operations of this institution and wishes to state categorically that all certificates obtained from it will not be recognized or be accepted in Nigeria for the purposes of NYSC, employment and or further studies.

NUC also wishes to advise state,

governments and the private sector to always cross check with the NUC before patronizing any institution purporting to award degrees in any part of Nigeria to avoid embarrassment.

For the avoidance of doubt, AL-NAHDA International University, Niamey, Gusau Satellite Campus is not known to the National Universities Commission which is the sole regulatory agency for all categories of degree awarding institutions in Nigeria and any Cross Border Education model operating in Nigeria.

Their activities violate the Education National Minimum Standards and Establishment of Institutions Act Cap E3 2004, an act which mandates NUC to close down all unapproved degree-awarding institutions.

Consequently, the Proprietors and Promoters of this illegal degree mill are by this notice directed to close down their illegal activities within 30 days. They are also to give the National Universities Commission notice of compliance within the stated period or be ready to face the consequences of their illegal operations.

The affected Officers are expected to perform their duties from home while those on GL 13 and above should strictly adhere to the extant preventive measures including maintenance of physical distancing, regular washing of hands and/or sanitizing of hands, wearing of face masks and reducing the number of visitors to offices. A copy of the Circular is attached for proper guidance and for Vice-Chancellors to ensure full compliance with the directives of the Federal Government, as appropriate.

I am to add that, in line with the directives of the Presidential Task Force (PTF) on COVID-19 on Monday, 21st December, 2020, all academic activities, involving large crowds (e.g. classrooms, hostel accommodation, conferences and seminars), should be suspended whilst the Universities remain closed during this intervening period, pending further directives by the Federal Government on the reopening of schools.

LIBERIAN AUTHORITIES DESIGNATE PRIVATE UNIVERSITY ILLEGAL FOR OFFERING UNACCREDITED GRADUATE DEGREE **PROGRAMS**

I wish to draw your attention to a report which informed that the Liberian Ministry of Education has designated Gamaliel Christian International University as illegal for offering twelve (12) to sixteen (16) weeks long graduate degree programs without requisite accreditation and extorting money from unsuspecting students, mostly foreigners including Nigerians.

- Consequent upon the foregoing, you may wish to kindly consider flagging the University as unaccredited and as well advise prospective Nigerian students against seeking admissions into the University.

FME SAFETY GUIDELINES ON SCHOOL RE-OPENING

- Safe distancing procedures
- Develop and display at schools, simple context-specific reference protocols on day to day actions to be operated in each school.
- Conduct risk assessment with a view to understanding the gaps in the system that can increase the risk of transmission and make recommendations for addressing the gaps
- Safety and hygiene in all stages and phases of the school reopening process, which promotes behaviors that reduce spread, such as school commutes (to and from school traveling), safe distancing, frequent hand washing and the use of facemasks.
- Other guiding frameworks include sensitization and monitoring procedures.
- Ensure adequate Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) facilities across the school premises
- Encouraging the use of open spaces for gathering and promoting outdoor activities.
- There should be regular temperature checks For all the visitors coming into the schools using infrared thermometers.
- Establish a staff/students committee for regular surveillance, monitoring, and enforcement of COVID-19 guidelines.
