NUC, MDGIF, Interact on Energy Solution for NUS

he Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL, has said the interaction with the management of Midstream & Downstream Infrastructure Fund (MDGIF) would afford the NUC the opportunity to rub minds with them on the importance of proffering energy solution to Nigerian Universities which, according to him, was an important missing link in the University system.

Professor Rasheed stated this last week Friday at an interaction meeting with a delegation led by the Executive Director, Midstream & Downstream Infrastructure Fund (MDGIF), Alh Mansur Kuliya, which came to discuss alternative energy supplies issues in Nigerian Universities.

He added that energy constituted a critical component of running a University and that to live in uncertainty of having constant light was something we had forcefully embraced in the nation's University campuses over the past three

decades.

The Executive Secretary told the delegation that in the 70's when

The NUC scribe said that government had spent billions of naira to put power in the nation's Universities' Campuses but that it had compounded the problem. He cited the example of the Bayero University Kano (BUK) which installed one centralized solar plant of 3.6 KVA and made it an integrated one with diesel, National grid and solar power with 2160 batteries. He said the Vice-Chancellor informed him that he needed N900m to replace the batteries for optimal usage.

Professor Rasheed explained further that despite the huge amount of money spent on the project; this infrastructure did not guarantee the University light for 24hours, not even for 14hrs, as the Institution was buying one truck a week of 40,000 liters which,

The NUC Scribe said that it was on this premise that the ED MDGIF Alh. Mansur Kuliya approached him with a proposal to invite some Vice-Chancellors of some Universities to explore the possibility of getting this form of energy to the Universities. He recounted that both teams agreed to bring the consultants to come and interface with the Vice-Chancellors to explore the possibility of migrating to this form of energy.

Professor Rasheed told the visitors that the role of NUC was to mediate and ensure smooth and speedy take-off of the project, explaining that the pilot scheme would comprise the first six and the other seven generation universities along with some selected institutions that had

In his remarks, Alhaji Mansur Kuliya, expressed delight for the warm reception accorded them and congratulated the Executive Secretary on the giant strides recorded in the Nigerian University System (NUS). He told the NUC management that the Petroleum Industrial Act (PIA) of 2021 Section 52 established the Midstream & Downstream Gas Infrastructure Fund.

Alh. Kuliya said MDGIF was established to open gas industries and infrastructure, adding that since the advent of Crude Oil in Nigeria, investment was done mainly on hydrocarbons. He said the gas reserve in Nigeria was enough to cater for the energy needs of the country and Africa at

management that with this investment, Universities would be able to generate 24hrs reliable electricity. He said if the project was properly implemented in two years, Nigerian Universities would be able to generate enough electricity to meet the needs of the university system.

In his remarks, the Project Consultant, Complete Energy Solutions, Engr. Kayode Akiode

collapse, adding that the plant could be installed in six months. He told the Vice-Chancellors that there would be initial cost, but added that if the private sector was involved things would work better. He cited the case of the GSM revolution, assuring that quality of education would improve once there is an improvement in the electricity supply.

The Executive Director, MDGIF highlighted the major mandates of the Fund to include; encouraging private investment in the gas sector; reducing gas flaring to the barest minimum and generating revenue from reduced gas flaring which accounts for loss of revenue to the tune of \$5bn.

Alh kuliya highlighted the case of BUK where the University spent millions of naira monthly and still could not generate 24hrs electricity, assuring the NUC

said that seeing the loophole in the electricity problems in the universities, the company had come up with more affordable ways which would provide 24hours uninterrupted power supply. He said a typical gas plant could run for six months with less noise and emission without putting it off, saying that it is cheaper than diesel and there is flexibility of choosing source.

He added that currently, Nigeria has 222 universities comprising of 50 federal, 61 states and 111

privately-owned universities, adding that, however, the total enrolment of all of them accounted for only 2.5% of the 200 million populations.

Professor Rasheed further stated that Nigeria needed more universities considering the population and the eligible candidates who applied for university education on yearly basis but could not get the admission due to space. He, therefore, encouraged corporate organizations and wealthy Nigerians and those in the diaspora who wished to give back to the society to invest in higher education by establishing universities.

The NUC Scribe mentioned that NOUN created a huge opportunity for those wishing to actualize their dreams in earning a degree to do so while combining it with their career or business, adding that NOUN had the largest graduates cutting across several disciplines.

He expressed NUC's satisfaction with activities of NOUN and commended Professor Okebukola and his team for the milestone recorded in the institution.

In her remarks, the guest lecturer and first female Vice-Chancellor of UNISA appreciated the Executive Secretary and his management for the warm reception accorded them at such a short notice.

She said her University would be willing to partner with Nigerian universities and foster collaboration in a number of programmes and projects particularly in research and innovation. ES Tasks NINLAN Mgt. to Pursue Postgraduate Varsity

he Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed mni, MFR, FNAL, has advised the management of National Institute for Nigerian Languages (NINLAN), to pursue

support the universities and the Industry.

The Executive Secretary argued that he would not support the idea of NINLAN becoming a University, as he believed that if somebody from the West could that Institute and the same could be said of the Arabic Language Village in Borno State where Arabic Language was the official language.

He said there were about one million Nigerians who speak the

a Postgraduate university and avoid being in competition with anyone as there were already a good number of existing universities awarding degrees in such areas across the country.

He made the plea last Monday when he received in audience, the Chairman, Governing Council of the Professor Francis Egbokhare alongside the Executive Director in his office.

Professor Rasheed suggested that they could offer courses in Nigerian Languages which, according to him, would be more attractive, if well managed.

He added that such arrangement could produce manpower to

speak the Yoruba language why would such individual go to a university to study it, stressing that the same thing applied to other languages. He said the reason for citing NINLAN in Abia was just for geo-political reason whereby all the six regions must be represented since the country already had the French Language village in Badagry, Arabic Language Village in Ngala Borno State and the Nigerian Mathematical Centre in Abuja.

Professor Rasheed noted that the French Village was cited at Badagry very close to Benin Republic whose citizen spoke the French Language which was of good benefit to the students in Arabic dialect especially in the Shua-Arab area of Borno State, adding that the Mathematical Centre was established to promote the teaching of Mathematics.

Professor Rasheed explained further that if NINLAN insisted on becoming a university the stumbling block was the renaming of the structures, a Senate must be in place like what was obtainable in the university. He stated that the law could be applied when renaming as most of the structures have to be changed, explaining that in such a situation the NINLAN structure might be lost to gain a university.

In his remarks, Chairman, Governing Council of NINLAN,

Professor Francis Egbokhare, said that the Institute wanted to align itself to the Nigerian universities by becoming a degree awarding

Professor Egbokhare believed that job opportunities were many for NINLAN graduates and he also agreed with the Executive Secretary that converting NINLAN to a postgraduate school would be more attractive and changes would structural he done in view of what the Executive Secretary said.

He explained that they were working hard to actualize the NINLAN mandate, arguing that using Nigerian Languages to teach in the universities was still a big challenge but that a strong NILAN would actualize this policy.

He said that the University performed generally well in the last Accreditation exercise but wondered why the university's management's tried to influence

Prof. Rasheed said that there were laid down criteria for any programme such as the Nursing Programme to earn Full Accreditation or any other status which the University was already aware of.

He, therefore, expressed the Commission's displeasure with the Novena University management's contention and attempt to influence the accreditation result, but another team would be sent to re-accredit the Programme.

Responding, the Vice-Chancellor of the University, Professor Godwin Nduka apologized to the Executive Secretary and acknowledged the important role that the NUC played in university education in Nigeria. He assured the Executive Secretary that such an incident would not repeat itself again.
