He said: "I understand that the technical session would be dominated by discussion on the African Union Agenda 2063, which drives the African education system for now, this conference, coming at this time is very strategic.

"We are aware that when COVID-19 started, there were these apocalyptic predictions that the street of Africa would be littered with corpses, but we were lucky and also strategic, whether you like it or not, because we put in place measures that help us tackle the health aspect of the pandemic.

"What we were not able to do effectively was to devise how to deal with the socio-economic impact of the pandemic and specifically for the education sector. We did not have the necessary infrastructure that would have enabled us to adopt the blended educational system that was put to use by most developing nations and that gave us a push back", he stated.

Mr. Adejoh explained that most African universities, especially public ones, remained shut down for almost a year which led to the

disruption of academic calendar as well as the expected output of graduates, adding that in Nigeria, some universities were still running their 2021/2022 academic session, with other back-log of academic activities

He described as germane the rationale behind establishing the FIAU in 2019, which was a direct response to the adverse effect of the COVID-19 on Africa's education sector, adding that the forum encouraged intellectual debates and knowledge exchange while working with highly reputable regional and global partners to pull resources to support African Universities.

He stated that the push was what the Continent needed in the post pandemic era to enable it overcome the challenges occasioned by the pandemic.

The Permanent Secretary called on all participants to take advantage of the rich topics discussed in the conference and to use them to the benefits of their respective institutions and the Nigerian University System (NUS) at large.

He also assured that the FME would continue to work closely with the Forum and ensure that its recommendations were implemented at all levels of education in Nigeria.

Presenting the Keynote Address, the Acting Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Mr. Chris J. Maiyaki, stated that higher education which form the vital pillar of societies, faced unprecedented challenges due to

Covid-19.

He pointed out that institutions had to swiftly adapt to the new modes of teaching and learning, grapple with remote education and navigate the digital divide, with very limited resources.

He said that the resilience and resourcefulness displayed by educators and students in navigating these obstacles had been commendable.

Mr. Chris Maiyaki, who also spoke on behalf of the Former Executive Secretary, Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni., MFR, FNAL, stated that leaders of the education sector must ensure that graduates of the Continent were fully equipped with the required skills and knowledge to succeed in the 21st Century.

He urged them to constantly strive to improve and update the educational programmes in line with global best practices.

While acknowledging that it was during this time of adversity, that universities were stretched beyond their limits, occasioned by limited

resources and the Covid-19 pandemic, but further argued that it was precisely during these same period of adversity that innovation and collaboration had flourished.

He also informed participants that one of such innovative steps, taken recently, by the NUC, as part of its efforts to reposition the Nigerian University System (NUS), for e x c ellence and global competitiveness, was the lunch of the Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standards (CCMAS) for the 17 disciplines in the NUS with emphasis on the acquisition of 21st Century employability skills.

He stressed that in preparing the CCMAS, the NUC, through a multistakeholder collegiate, discussed extensively with the Academia, Nigerian Professionals Bodies as well as the private sector, involved via the Nigerian Economic Summit Group (NESG).

The essence was to develop curricula that was fit-for-purpose for the training of 21st Century graduates and to especially cultivate an entrepreneurial mindset amongst students, with the hope to foster a

culture of innovation, creativity, and problem-solving that would drive economic growth and social development.

He told the gathering that all programmes in the 17 disciplines in the re-engineered curricula had p r o g r a m m e - s p e c i fi c entrepreneurship courses that were compulsory and obligatory as it sought to create in the students the mindset of innovation and self- employability, upon graduation.

Speaking in his position as Acting Executive Secretary, Mr. Maiyaki mentioned that the Commission had transcended traditional boundaries to harness the power of collaboration and foster sustainable university-industry partnership which had enabled the Commission to align the new CCMAS with the evolving needs of the job market and create graduates that would be wellversed in theory and also posses the practical skills demanded by employers.

He added that the collaboration with industries would enable

universities conduct impact researches that addressed realworld challenges by continuing to impact mankind so as to secure tangible socio-economic development.

Mr. Maiyaki also stated that the Covid-19 pandemic had imposed new obligations on both learning and administrative cultures.

By this, virtual learning, zoom meetings, seminars and workshops had become the imperatives of the medical necessities of the p a n d e m i c, a d d i n g t h a t administrators must be on top of these new developments as well as conversant with and master the technology and techniques of the virtual interactions, including developing new mindset.

He highlighted that the NUC had taken some significant steps towards developing a draft National Policy for the implementation of Open Education Resources (OER), noting that embracing the global emergence of OER presented a promising solution to ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education that would promote

lifelong learning opportunities for all, reduce costs, facilitate the use of ICT in education, and improve access to learning in Nigeria.

He added that OER hold immense potentials for the realisation of Sustainable Development Goal 4(SDG4), which aims to advance lifelong learning and promote equitable and inclusive education. He explained that it was done with the hope that a repeat of the complete shutdown of teaching and learning experienced by many Nigerian Universities during the pandemic would be a thing of the past as Universities could now sustain their academic activities.

He charged the participants to harness the spirit of innovation, collaboration and resilience in order to build a future where universities would be thriving centres of knowledge, and foster leaders/change makers that the African Continent needed.

While providing background on the emergence of the Forum, the Director General / Chief Executive, Industrial Training Fund (ITF), Sir Joseph N. gained autonomy in 1960 in order to provide University education in the country.

Thereafter, the first generation universities were birthed in 1962, followed by the popular seven sisters in (Lagos, Kano, Ilorin, Jos, Calabar, Sokoto and Maiduguri in 1975 and now the Commission regulates about 260 Universities under its motherly care in all nooks and crannies of Nigeria.

He added that the Commission would not rest on its oars provided there remained upward demand for tertiary education and the need existed to supply a well- coordinated University education to the Nigerian society through granting access and equity in higher education.

Mr. Maiyaki further highlighted that the NUC had been empowered by law to regulate and coordinate

Through this process, he disclosed that seasoned experts, not resident in the Commission, were brought on board to bring to bare their wealth of experience on the specifics of various disciplines and since the Curriculum had always evolved with the times, the Commission also had to keep on fine tuning it to serve this purpose.
