

Prof. Rasheed Steps Down to Resume Teaching in BUK

The Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL, last Monday, informed the Management and staff of his stepping down as the Chief Executive of the Commission, in order to continue with his passion of teaching in the classroom at Bayero University Kano (BUK).

He made the revelation to the members of the NUC family at a farewell meeting he held describing the decision as personal.

The announcement was received with consternation and trepidation by many who taught that the rumor was just a ruse for a man who many loves and regards as very kind and humane in his dealings with all strata of the staff.

Giving insight on his choice, Professor Rasheed said himself and the management team tried their best to implement some of the recommendations that was presented to him by the staff on

assumption of office about seven years ago.

He said: "I chose to stand before the staff of NUC to confirm the widely circulated rumor about

my exit from office. This is true and well-thought out by me. I purposely chose to disengage from the Commission and get back to my pride. I have lost interaction with my PhD students in the last couple of years," he stated.

He further explained that it was a voluntarily decision to step down so as to save himself of the stress of the Office, stating that he hardly rest even at weekends and his body told him its time to quit but would continue to be part of the education sector and NUC.

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He expressed the view that people had to leave for the young ones to grow and jokingly said that if NUC invite him for accreditation he will honour the invitation.

He said that in all honesty, he enjoyed working with the NUC staff and that it was the love he had for all that made him stay long in the job.

The NUC Scribe then revealed that he wrote a letter to the Minister of Education seeking permission to step down but in a way to dissuade him from quitting earlier, the Minister delayed the transmission of the letter to the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria for his approval.

He clarified that his resignation was not on health ground, saying that God had graced him with energy and remained agile, chiding that he could outpace many in a 10km race with his current state of health.

He said that the entire management and staff of BUK got confused about his decision and was not sure whether it was good or bad omen,

but expressed delight to return to the University.

In his words: “BUK is ready to welcome me with open arms and anytime from 1st July, I will resume lecturing once again. First, I will report to my Vice-Chancellor, who is graciously waiting to receive me back into the university environment. “Thereafter, I will proceed on a short leave to rest and would resume then in October, after all I was a lecturer before my appointment as the Executive Secretary of NUC,” he added.

He assured the staff that his heart would forever be in the Commission because he enjoyed working with the NUC family, noting that though he must have offended some persons that it was not as Professor Rasheed, but, the ES NUC, asserting his official position.

He said that he would forever cherish the memory of his last seven years despite the enormous challenges inherent in the system, noting that his team did its best to move the university education forward.

Some of the targets it set which he expressed pride on included the revitalization and improvement of university education through the assistance of an excellent team of advisers from within and outside.

He particularly mentioned the STRADVCOM team, an NUC Advisory body led by Emeritus Professor Peter Okebukola, OFR,

He used the forum to declare that by Friday the 30th of June, 2023, he would hand over affairs to the Deputy Executive Secretary (DES) Administration, Mr. Chris J. Maiyaki, in line with extant provisions of the Public Service Rule (PSR).

He said that the Executive Secretary was one man that has maintained closeness with his friends and associates and was fortunate to have led a strong team that worked with him which made his work easier.

Professor Alkali described the Executive Secretary as a man of principle, honour and wished him well and sound health despite having 3 years and one month left in office.

Speaking via zoom, the Vice-Chancellor of BUK, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas thanked the Executive Secretary of NUC for changing the landscape of university education in Nigeria.

Mr Maiyaki Takes Over Affairs of NUC

The out-gone Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, MFR, FNAL, handed over the baton of leadership of the Commission to the Deputy Executive Secretary (DES), Administration, Mr. Chris Jibreel Maiyaki, as the Acting Executive Secretary, being the most senior officer in the system.

He carried out this symbolic ceremony last Friday, in line with extant provisions of Public Service Rules (PSR), during his last chat with the Education Correspondents Association of Nigeria (ECAN).

Mr. Maiyaki's new position as the Acting Executive Secretary followed the earlier approval of the President of the disengagement of Professor Rasheed, as the substantive Executive Secretary, through a conveyance letter from the Honourable Minister of

University, Kano (BUK).

Before this Acting position, Mr. Maiyaki had been the Deputy Executive Secretary, Administration (NUC), since 1st October, 2020. He stepped into the new shoes effective from 1st July, 2023.

While receiving the Hand Over Brief, the Acting Executive Secretary, Mr. Maiyaki promised to continue to pilot the affairs of NUC in line with the

NUC Legacy Documents Committee, among others.

The new Acting Executive Secretary graduated, with a B.Sc (Hons) degree in International Relations from the famous Ahmadu Bello University (ABU), Zaria, Kaduna State, Master of Arts (M.A degree) in International Law and Diplomacy from the University of Jos, Plateau State and has received several trainings (within and outside Nigeria) which pertained to International Affairs

and Educational Planning, Accreditation and Quality Assurance, Partnerships and Collaboration, Procurement & project Management, Computer Application in Human Resource

Administrative Secretary for the World Bank Project Implementation Unit based in the NUC, which oversaw the execution of the USD120m Credit facility for twenty

covered participation in various Adhoc committee and panels set up to address specific problems/ challenges in the Nigerian University System pursuant to NUC's over-arching mandate in policy formulation & implementation, general coordination & regulation of university education in Nigeria.

Management, all tailored around the specifics of Higher Education Management, Regulation and Knowledge diplomacy, among others.

Mr. Maiyaki began his public service career spanning well over 30 years ago, as a young Administrative Officer, precisely in 1990 with the Policy & Administrative arm of the Cabinet office located in the Governor's office in Jos, Plateau State.

He, however, moved to the National Universities Commission on inter-service transfer in 1993, as Personnel/ Administrative Officer I, in 1993, where on assumption of duty was appointed the

participating federal universities. At the expiration of the project which was adjudged to be one of the best administered in the World Bank Education portfolio in Nigeria, Mr. Maiyaki was redeployed from 1996, to work in various arms of the Commission where he has fulfilled various secondary and primary leadership function positions.

He then became Deputy Director Special Duties & Protocol and Chief of Staff to the Executive Secretary between November 2009 to October 2014, culminating to his promotion in October 2014, to the rank of a Substantive Director.

His entire work in NUC also

He has also participated actively, in recent internationalization efforts and the promotion of bilateral cooperation between the NUC, Development Partners and diplomatic missions located in Nigeria and beyond.

Following his resourcefulness, Mr. Maiyaki coordinated the Secretariat which superintended the linkages with Experts and Academics in the Diaspora Scheme (LEADS), under which auspices, Experts and Academics of Nigerian extraction based overseas, were engaged back home in Teaching, Research and Community Action. He has also till date, continued to play an important role in the Secretariat for the implementation of the NYSC Presidential Honours Scholarship Scheme as well as the Presidential Special Scholarship Scheme for Innovation and Development (PRESSID).

Between 2000 and 2001, Mr. Maiyaki also served on the Secretariat of the Government Negotiating Team set up to negotiate thorny issues with the staff unions associated with the universities.

Just recently, he was part of the Adhoc Committee that developed

the blueprint for open and distance learning, The Committee on A Unified Audit Manual for Universities, NUC at 51, The National Steering Committee on Open Educational Resources (OER), The Strategy Advisory Committee on the Revitalisation of University Education, The FME/NUC National Education Summit.

Other notable engagements include most of the Preparatory Activities towards UNESCO and UN General Conferences/ Assembly, International Bureau for Education, respectively and the administration of various UNESCO fellowships and regular calls for nominations by prospective scholars.

Mr. Maiyaki has developed solid organizational, managerial, negotiation and administrative skills at the NUC, where he at some point, served as the Special Assistant to the erstwhile Executive Secretary, Professor Peter Okebukola, OFR, Senior Special

Assistant and subsequently Chief of Staff to the immediate past Executive Secretary, Professor Julius A Okojie, OON.

In the course of duty, he was named the Executive Secretary's/Secretariat Best Worker of the year 2003, among several other commendation letters from NUC's Development Partners and key stakeholders across the board.

In addition, he has over the past 15 years, successfully anchored in liaison with the Public Affairs Section of the American Embassy, the International Visitor Leadership Programme for newly-appointed Vice-Chancellors who at each stage, undertook on the spot assessment of the challenges of Higher Education, in the United States of America, given that country's large system.

He has also facilitated several study visits, meetings and

conferences, aimed at improving the executive capacities of university managers in conjunction with the British Council, UNESCO, African Union, ECOWAS, Association of Commonwealth Universities, and European Union Delegation to Nigeria, Quality Assurances Agency, Oxford Academy of Education and Development as well as the Turkish Higher Education Community, among others.

Mr. Maiyaki as Chair of the Management Adhoc Committee on Legacy Document was saddled with the task to Identify and digitise Legacy Documents from the inception of the NUC.

The new Acting Executive Secretary, is married with three children, widely travelled and speaks several international languages.

Kogi Gets New University in Kabba

The National Universities Commission (NUC) has approved the establishment of Kogi State University, Kabba, as the 62nd state universities and the 265th universities in the country.

With the latest approval, Kogi State now has three universities. The other two are: Prince Abubakar Audu University at Anyingba and Confluence University of Science and Technology at Osara.

“By this, the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund), National Youth Service Corp (NYSC) and the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) are being notified of the establishment of the university,” he said.

The immediate past Executive Secretary, NUC, Professor Abubakar Rasheed, made this known in Abuja on Monday, when the Executive Governor of Kogi State, His Excellency, Yahaya Bello paid him a visit.

Professor Rasheed said that the Commission had on June 19, received a letter on the formal presentation of gazetted documents establishing the university.

The new university would expectedly commence academic and non-academic engagements in September, 2023.

“I write on behalf of the NUC to inform his excellency that with effect from June 26, 2023, Kogi State University, Kabba has been established as the 62nd state universities and 265th university in Nigeria.

NUC pledges its support to the university as we urge you to take full advantage of the institution.

The governor received the recognition from Professor Rasheed who announced his resignation as the NUC Executive Secretary to the consternation of his guests.

Professor Rasheed also informed newsmen that his decision to step down from the NUC was to resume lecturing at the Bayero University Kano, where he came from.

He said he had spent seven years as the Executive Secretary of the Commission and needed to return to the classroom.

While responding on the university's approval, the elated Governor Bello said that the University would be cited in the Kogi West Senatorial District for fairness, equity and justice.

He said that the university was established to satisfy the age-long desire of the Okun people of the state.

He said the state had set out modalities to ensure the university start on a good note, as resources had been set aside for its take-off.

“In Kogi State, education is our heritage and education is what we are proud of, both within the state, across the country and globally.

“When I came on board, we have only one university. We ran to the commission and we established the Confluence University of Science and Technology, Osara.

“But something is necessary because we have a senatorial district in Kogi West and because we want every part of the state to be carried along.

“We deemed it necessary to situate the university in Okun land for the sake of our brothers there.

“With over 600 professors in Okun land, we decided to establish the university immediately,” he said.

The governor said that the establishment of the university was not for politics as was being insinuated in some quarters but to address the educational desire of the people.

The Governor, who stressed that there were already mechanisms in place to establish the university, expressed the hope that the first set

This was contained in a statement signed by the Secretary of the University's Board of Trustees, Dr. Arome M. Okwori on behalf of ECWA President and made available to newsmen in Abuja.

JAMB Stakeholders Hold Policy Meeting on 2023 Admissions, Releases Cut-Off

The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and stakeholders in tertiary education across the nation have jointly approved the “National Minimum Tolerable UTME Score (NTMUS)” or more commonly referred to as the cut-off mark for 2023 admission into Nigeria’s universities.

Following the Policy Meeting, the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and tertiary education stakeholders later established the cut-off marks for 2023 university admissions in Nigeria. The cut-off stands at 140 for universities and 100 for Polytechnics and Colleges of Education. This decision would affect private universities that had earlier chosen lower minimum points. Such universities would need to increase their thresholds to at least 140.

The benchmarks were finalized at the 2023 annual policy meeting on admissions into tertiary institutions. The meeting, convened in Abuja, resulted in a cut-off of 140 for Universities and a cut-off of 100 for Polytechnics and Colleges of Education. This pivotal meeting was Chaired by the Permanent Secretary, Federal Ministry of Education (FME), Mr. David Andrew Adejoh, who took the final decision following recommendations from institutional heads.

JAMB Registrar and Chief Executive Officer, Professor Is-haq Oloyede stated that the approved minimum benchmark should not be

a one-size-fits-all solution. The meeting established minimum acceptable score, but institutions have the liberty to raise their minimum points higher than the

agreed benchmark, reflecting the unique requirements and standards of each institution.

“Anything we decide here will become the minimum. What it means is that nobody can go below it,” explained Professor Oloyede. This indicated a clear distinction between the floor and the ceiling of admission scores, with the opportunity for individual institutions to raise the ceiling as per their preferences.

The implications of this decision were significant, particularly for about fifteen private universities that had earlier selected 120 and 130 as minimum points. These institutions were advised to increase their minimum points to at least 140. Simultaneously, all Polytechnics and Colleges of Education were obliged not to admit students scoring less than

the 100 minimum score.

The process of determining these cut-off points was not unilateral but rather a democratic one involving all stakeholders. All tertiary institutions send their individually preferred minimum points to JAMB ahead of the meeting.

At the Policy Meeting, university Vice-Chancellors, Rectors of Polytechnics, and Provosts of Colleges of Education engaged in a discussions to agree upon a minimum benchmark for admission. After thorough discussion, the minimum benchmark favoured by the majority of stakeholders was adopted, providing a fair and balanced approach to setting admission criteria.

The updated cut-off marks set a new precedent for admission standards in Nigeria, ensuring that students meet a universally recognized standard, while also allowing institutions the flexibility to uphold their unique academic requirements.
