STEAM. They made this known, last week, when they visited the National Universities Commission (NUC), Abuja.

Receiving the delegation, the Ag. Executive Secretary, Mr.

Maiyaki told the visitors that the Commission had always engaged policy makers and professional bodies, including the industries to add value to tertiary education in Nigeria. reviewed curriculum with professional bodies.

He stressed that curriculum development was about review, and the universities had been

Council (WAEC), National Examinations Council (NECO), National Business and Technical Examination Board (NABTEB) and the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

He said that NUC had reviewed the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standard (BMAS) to Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standard (CCMAS).

Mr. Maiyaki explained that today, the NUC, the Universities, Nigeria, Africa and indeed the world are celebrating the CCMAS, saying that as the world was evolving, the Commission had to be dynamic by rolling out the CCMAS document to meet the expectations of the industries and the global community.

He said that since 1974 to date, NUC had always carried out its mandates, laid down the minimum academic standard and given the liberty to contribute 30% of its own quota to the CCMAS document, according to the peculiarities of their environment. He said that NUC was open to criticism and that the professional bodies were free to meet the Commission in the spirit of a win win situation.

In her remarks, the Chairperson, STEAM Education, Professor Obioma Nwaorgu, argued that the weak education system in Nigeria, especially at the pre-tertiary level conspicuously reflected in the poor performance of students who sat for the examinations conducted by the West African Examinations Professor Nwaorgu said that the grievous consequences of the failing education system included shortage of skilled personnel, high unemployment, national insecurity and poor economic prospects.

She canvased for the need to intervene at the sub national levels to improve the quality of pre-tertiary education, to enable Nigeria to prosper in an increasingly competitive world, driven by scientific innovation and advanced technology.

She highlighted that over the past 25 years, STEM education had been evolving globally from an integration of four overlapping disciplines –



Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics to a n integrated and interdisciplinary approach to learning and skill development, where rigorous academic concepts were coupled with practical applications.

She said that STEM education continued to broaden and deepen in scope, by transcending the fields of performing Arts, English, Literature, History, Religious Studies, Philosophy and Languages.

The meeting in session

She stressed that STEAM education continued to be a significant national priority for driving technological change, economic prosperity and security. She, however, noted that STEAM education in Nigeria did not have the desired national priority status it required.

She advocated for STEAM knowledge and literacy to be learnt at an early age in Primary and Secondary schools as essential pre requisites to tertiary education (technical training to advance college level and graduate study) and increased technical skills at the workplace.

Professor Nwaorgu said that NAS, NAL, NYA, in conjunction with JAMB had proposed ways to advance STEAM education at the Primary and Secondary education in Nigeria, with a view to contributing to the uptake and quality of STEAM education in

the country.

She said, the specific objectives of the project were to, among other things, advocate and mainstream the implementation of locally- appropriate STEAM education policies into the curriculum and extra curriculum activities in schools; strengthen the capacity of pre-school, Primary and Secondary teachers in STEAM educational strategies and approaches.

She mentioned other objectives to include; highlight career development matters, through the development and testing of innovative concepts and ideas for employment and cultural understanding, among the next generation of Nigerians. She noted that increasing awareness would stimulate interest and foster STEAM literacy among students in pretertiary schools.

global and regional platforms. "It also hopes to serve as a strategic way to advance impactful innovations in the country, while building local capacity and promoting diversity".

She further stated that the Nutrition Society of Nigeria, as the largest convening body for nutrition professionals and allied partners in Nigeria, was poised to further engage widely, to mobilize and inspire change for health and development through innovation in Nigeria. multidisciplinary research partnership framework, coordinated by the NSN in strong collaboration with key stakeholders, such as the Federal Ministry of Innovation, Science and Technology and others", she stated. "Its purpose is to catalyse a network of local researchers and development practitioners that are capacitated to innovate for impact, scalability, sustainability and gender equity around key public health, science and technology,

Therefore, over the past months, NSN had activated its networks and partnerships for high level in-country interactions with government and non-government agencies.

She said that NSN recognized the strategic and foundational role of the NUC in advancing cross-sectoral research initiatives and innovations in Nigeria, which would ensure the impact of Research and Development results in the Nigerian economy, through the promotion of indigenous research capacity to facilitate technology transfer.
