

Tinubu Orders Payment of Salaries owed Lecturers over ASUU Strike

The President and Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces, Federal Republic of Nigeria, Bola Ahmed Tinubu, GCFR, has approved a partial waiver of the “No Work, No Pay” order on striking members of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) and ordered the release of four months of withheld salary.

President Tinubu’s spokesperson, Chief Ajuri Ngelale, disclosed this in a statement last Friday, saying that the waiver was granted invoking the Principle of the Presidential Prerogative of Mercy, and in recognition of the faithful implementation of terms that were agreed upon during the fruitful deliberations between ASUU and the Federal Government of Nigeria.

Mr. Ngelale stated that the waiver “will allow for the previously striking members of ASUU to receive four months of salary accruals out of the eight months of salary which was withheld during the eight-month industrial action

undertaken by the union.”

The ASUU strike, which began on February 14, 2022 and ended on October 17, 2022, was the longest in the union’s history.

Mr. President had directed that the Federal Ministry of Education (FME) and the Federal Ministry of Labour and Employment secure a Document of Understanding (DoU)

It would be recalled that the strike was called over demands for improved funding for universities, increased salaries for lecturers, and better working conditions by the striking union.

were agreed upon during the deliberations between ASUU and the Federal Government of Nigeria.”

He reiterated the NUC's commitment to quality assurance and expansion of access to university education as Nigeria currently needed more universities with the current admission seekers yearly put at 2million and only about a little above quarter of the number securing enrolment.

The NUC scribe recounted that the USA has about 5000 universities while Brazil with comparable population as Nigeria boasted of 1000 universities, stressing that Nigeria was undersubscribed when viewed alongside its growth rate.

He however, noted that with the investment efforts of well-meaning Nigerians like the proprietors of El-Amin, the issue of access to education would be a

He said there was an attempt also in the recent past by the proprietor to establish Heritage University, which did not see the light of the day, due to facts and factors beyond anyone's control.

He, however, stated that what was lost in heritage have been gained in El-Amin.

He told the meeting of the efforts of well-meaning Nigerians such as the likes of Afe Babalola towards improving the nation's university education landscape.

He said it was with a deep sense of pride to welcome staff of the Commission to the one day sensitization seminar on four key Doel guidelines and urged staff to apply themselves with the guidelines.

In his welcome remarks, the Deputy Executive Secretary (Academics), Dr. Noel Saliu said, though the seminar was an in house event, there were a lot of

As stakeholders, he stressed that it was imperative to sensitize NUC staff to be worthy ambassadors of the Commission.

In her presentation on the Guidelines for the establishment of Private Open Universities in Nigeria, the Deputy Director, ODL, Hajia Hadiza Ramalan, said that “Private Open University is a normal university but the only difference is the mode of delivery”. She said Private Open University resembles a conventional university but one striking difference has to do with access. The latter has unlimited barrier to admission requirements.

She said the guidelines has four headings: the Criteria for the

establishment of an institution of higher education in Nigeria; Guidelines for establishing private open universities in Nigeria; Conditions for the establishment of open universities in Nigeria and Steps in the processing of applications for the establishment of private open universities.

She said all promoters wishing to establish Universities or degree awarding institutions must comply with the Federal Government approved guidelines and conditions under the NUC Act Cap. E3 Laws of the Federation of Nigeria 2004.

She said Federal Government; States, duly registered companies in Nigeria, individuals or group of individuals who were citizens of

Nigeria and who satisfied the guidelines and conditions of establishing universities or degree awarding institutions could seek to establish a higher education institution.

She added that applications to establish a private open university shall be made to the Minister of Education through the NUC.

In his presentation, on the Implementation of National Policy on Open Educational Resource, the Deputy Director, Open Educational Resource (OER), Mr. Tukur Ladan took the meeting through memory lane on the background of the National Policy of the OER.

He said that the Federal Ministry of Education, through the Commission, established the National Steering Committee on OER in 2017, to draft a National OER Policy and to design and create an OER repository for the Tertiary Education System.

Mr. Ladan said, NUC championed the development of OER Policy for Higher Education in Nigeria and the Policy was presented to the global community at the second world OER congress in Ljubljana, Slovenia in September, 2017. kit was approved for implementation during the Ministerial Session of the 63rd NCE in August, 2018 by Federal Government.

Mr. Ladan said guidelines for the implementation of national policy on OER in Nigerian higher education goals of the guidelines included provision of framework

for the operationalization of OER in Nigerian Higher Institutions; to ensure the development and deployment of OER materials in consonance with the national vision and National Policy on Education and associated instruments as well as to ensure

that OERs align with the objectives of the Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standards (CCMAS).

Others, he added, included to provide context and structure for the promotion and advancement of OER in Nigerian Higher Institutions; to promote the philosophy and culture of OER in

Nigerian Institutions and to motivate research, scholarship and funding of OER in Nigerian Higher Institutions, among others.

In her presentation, the Deputy Director, Transnational Education, Mrs. Funke Sule said Transnational Education (TNE) referred to the movement of people, programmes, providers, knowledge, ideas, projects and services across national boundaries. The term was often used interchangeably with “offshore education” and “borderless education”.

Transnational Education involved educational partnerships, developmental cooperation projects, academic exchange programmes and commercial initiatives.

She said Nigeria had been a member of the World Trade Organization (WTO) since 1st January, 1995. “All members of the organization are party/signatories to the 1995 General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS), which was designed to increase trade liberalization.

The National Universities Commission (NUC) hopes to widen

access and fully exploit the provisions of GATS for the benefit of Nigerians.”

Mrs Sule said the benefits of TNE included being a borderless education system, Transnational Education has the potential to increase access to quality education, considering the limited space in the brick and mortar system of education.

The TNE strengthens academic capacity in research for National Development, meaning that the global demand for education, training and research propels the unprecedented worldwide mobility of academics from diverse field of life for the purpose of research for national development.

It also provides internationally recognized education at one’s space and time, being a system of education with a variety of models that cut across national and international boundaries. TNE addresses the challenge of space and time.

Dr. Gabriel Ligari, the Deputy Director e-Learning Division, in his presentation on guidelines for e-learning in Nigerian universities, noted that emerging global trends had necessitated the integration of e-learning into the process of teaching and learning.

He further explained that the revolution in Information and Communications Technology (ICT) had opened tremendous opportunities for improving pedagogies in higher education institutions.

Dr Ligari said the aims and objectives of the e-learning guidelines included; mainstreaming modern e-learning modes in the NUS; serve as a framework for the orderly integration of e-learning into university programmes. It ensured adherence to standards and outcomes of creativity and innovation, entrepreneurship and critical thinking, laid out in the Core Curriculum Minimum Academic Standards (CCMAS).

TETFUND Begins Second Phase of Employability Prog. for Instns.

The Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund), in collaboration with the International Finance Corporation (IFC) have commenced the second phase of employability programme in Nigerian universities.

The TETFund Executive Secretary, Architect Sonny Echono, who spoke at the National Employability Programme (NEP) implementation support workshop said the Fund had deliberately refocused its intervention activities to support learning outcomes and employability of Nigerian tertiary education graduates.

According to Architect Echono, the second phase of the employability programmes focused on the implementation of the recommendations from the bench-marking exercise and capacity building in the five employability dimensions which the IFC Vitae instrument examined.

It would be recalled that IFC assisted the Fund to conduct the employability bench-marking assessment programme for some selected universities, reflecting representative samples across the country between September 2022 and January 2023.

The Report indicated that the objective of undertaking the assessment of practices and processes supporting employability in higher institutions, was to identify sector trends and provide comparative

institutional findings on employability situations on a system level, to provide a starting baseline to guide the development of specific interventions at both institutional and system level.

“The Report of the employability benchmarking exercise covers the five dimensions of employability viz: relevance of learning,

Architect Echono said, “The IFC has deployed its Vitae Employability Tool through a programmatic sector level approach by engaging the institutions to develop a sector level language and data-driven understanding of employability.

“The stakeholders debriefing session held on 6 February 2023 on the early findings provided the opportunity for IFC to obtain inputs from key stakeholders, and enriched the final Report with far-reaching recommendations submitted to the Fund in April 2023. The Final Report was forwarded to

governance and strategy, employer engagement, career services/guidance, and alumni management.

It highlighted how student employability support at the universities aligns to good practices globally.

“The Report indicates that the aggregate average score of Nigerian benchmark institutions across the five dimensions of employability is 2.3 out of 4.0 which is just above the average of all institutions benchmarked globally (2.2).

“The Report which also covers the assessment of the institutions’ Digital Learning Strategy shows that surveyed universities lagged behind global best practices in application of digital learning strategies, access to large multidisciplinary databases and digital course-reserves as well as the level of faculty digital skills.

This obviously requires deliberate action on the part of all stakeholders to address our peculiar challenges.”

Speaking further, Architect Echono said Nigeria being a developing economy had been faced with the challenges of high unemployment, particularly youth unemployment which has quadrupled in the country.

According to him, an increasing number of young Nigerian graduates from tertiary education institutions were being released into the labour market with a continuously shrinking absorptive capacity.

The structure of the economy which was largely import dependent, he said, has further limited the ability of the country to generate commensurable jobs due to low level of industrialization, thereby aggravating the unemployment situation in Nigeria.

“Thus, aligning our intervention activities to meet our changing needs, and strengthening our education delivery towards fostering an entrepreneurship

culture are some of the best ways for unleashing the enormous youth potential, addressing unemployment as well as other societal problems, and growing the economy.

The TETFund ES asserted that strengthening entrepreneurship education and training were considered crucial in that regard.

“As an Intervention Agency for tertiary education in Nigeria, TETFund is deliberately refocusing its intervention activities to support learning outcomes and employability of Nigerian tertiary education graduates.

“I am pleased to report that the Strategic and Operational Plan for refocusing TETFund entrepreneurship intervention for employability and innovation was approved by the Federal Ministry of Education in March 2023. Consequently, the requirements and guidelines for accessing entrepreneurship development intervention of the Fund were revised in line with the approved Plan,” he said.

Adding, he noted that the Fund is in the process of establishing entrepreneurship and innovation hubs in our beneficiary institutions across the six geopolitical zones of the country, to link them with industry with a view to enhance entrepreneurship development, innovation and employability in line with contemporary global best practices.

These interventions, The TETFund Boss added, would help promote the transformation of our beneficiary institutions into catalysts for knowledge creation and organizing the translation of knowledge into usable products and services for addressing societal problems.

“All these efforts are geared towards facilitating the link between Research, Development, and Innovation with the processes of promoting and enhancing entrepreneurship development to ensure graduate employability for national development. The aim is to enable Nigerian tertiary institutions serve as catalysts for regional and national economic development by unlocking the knowledge potential to solve critical societal challenges.

“The Implementation Support Workshop for which we are all gathered here today, marks the commencement of the second phase of the employability programmes, focusing on the implementation of the recommendations from the benchmarking exercise and capacity building in the five employability dimensions which the IFC Vitae instrument examined,” he said.

The Executive Secretary further said the workshop would focus on establishing a common understanding of the sector based on the IFC global framework with actionable opportunities on the findings and recommendations from the bench-marking exercise, and promoting the adoption of

best practices and lessons learned from around the world in improving the processes and operations in tertiary level education institutions in Nigeria, and thus provide improved employability services nationally.

It would also facilitate broader strategic conversations around employability that contextualizes the challenges across student journey from access to employability, with a focus on implementing quality frameworks which emphasizes key performance indicators, employability support services and stronger linkages with industry.

Architect Echono, who said the quality of tertiary education and its contribution to national development remained the focus of TETFund's interventions and issues central to employability and

job-readiness of tertiary institutions graduates were particularly significant, said it was not surprising that the Honourable Minister of Education, Professor Tahir Mamman at his maiden briefing charged the Fund to focus on improving research infrastructure and entrepreneurship development to support employability for sustainable growth.

He added; "For our part, the Fund is committed to the implementation of the recommendations from the employability bench-marking exercise. We strongly believe that the implementation would ultimately improve graduate employment, and thus reduce the high rate of unemployment in

Nigeria.

"In line with the recommendations, the Fund is also organizing a capacity building programme for Career Unit Staff of our universities."

Meanwhile, the stakeholders debriefing session held on 6 February, 2023, on the early findings provided the opportunity for IFC to obtain inputs from key stakeholders, and enriched the final Report with far-reaching recommendations submitted to the Fund in April 2023.
