According to him, the 2022/2023 Nigeria's Annual Education Conference, which was held from 11th to 12th September,2023

2027), underpinned the Ministerial Deliverables and represented a compact signed between the management of the Federal Ministry of Education (FME) and Mr. President for which his tenure would be held accountable. Professor Mamman noted that the Ministry had further distilled the implementation of the Ministerial deliverables to a more detailed implementation with turn-around strategies that would be measurable and capable of providing results that

provided an opportunity for knowledge and experience which was useful in developing the Roadmap.

He recalled that upon assumption of office, his team reviewed existing strategic plans of the

Ministry and inaugurated a Committee to develop the Roadmap in line with the aspirations of President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, which was later subjected to Stakeholder review, adoption and approval for implementation by the National Council on Education at its 67th Session held on 14 and 15th December, 2023.

While harping on the disturbing scenario of out of school children, the HME highlighted that the President was committed to work towards returning 15million Out of School Children back to the classrooms by the year 2027.

He explained that a National Policy on Senior Secondary and Re-Entry Guidelines for Adolescent Girls who dropped out of school prematurely had also been developed and adopted by the National Council on Education.

These two policies, he stressed, would considerably advance the Ministry's interventions for returning more Nigerian Children back to School.

As a result, Professor Mamman stated that the administration had placed a high premium on foundational and basic education, strengthening integration of existing nonformal schools into formal education systems, scaling-up adult literacy and non-formal education interventions, increasing opportunities for girlchild education as well as forging partnerships with all tiers of government and development partners.

He further disclosed that the FME had began operationalizing the establishment of the National Commission for Almajiri and Out of School Children as well as approved a policy on Early Child Care Development

Education (ECCDE) and commenced engagement with State Governments on removing bottlenecks that negatively impacted on their ability to optimally utilise the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) funds.

The Minister also noted with pride that under the guidance of President Tinubu, the Ministry had held consultations with the Tertiary Institutions Based Unions and have began to build back trust as exemplified by the resolution of some of the pertinent issues in the sector.

He listed them to include: 35% increase in salaries of workers in the tertiary institutions; 4 months payment of salaries for the 8 months they were on strike in 2022; Removal from the Integrated Payment and Payroll Information System (IPPIS); and Granting autonomy for recruitment.

He said the Federal Ministry of Education would work with the Honourable Minister of Finance/ Coordinating Minister of the Economy and Office of the Head of the Civil Service of the Federation to ensure a seamless implementation of the issues.

The HME appreciated the uncommon understanding the unions have shown for the President Tinubu's administration and assured them that the issues would soon be implemented.

He informed the press that in line with the President's directive to stagger the establishment of already approved tertiary institutions, the Ministry have taken over the sites for establishment of the Federal College of Education Ilawe City. City State; While the blueprint against Social Vices Amongst

Children and Youth have also been disseminated to reduce the occurrence of all forms of vices in the school system.


Also ongoing include the Master Trainers programmes of staff who were being trained on Safe Schools Implementation especially among Education Secretaries and Safe Schools Desk Officers and Capacity Building Workshop for Teachers on Education in Emergencies (EIE) Strategies were also conducted. There was also a Capacity Building Training/Workshop and Empowerment for Traditional Rulers on the Role of Traditional Rulers in ensuring Safety and Security of Senior Secondary School Environment.

On the area to leverage technology for education, Professor Mamman also said the Ministry had started deepening the application of Technology to the Education sector by opening up discussions with the Honourable Minister of Communications and Digital Economy and engaging MasterCard in exploring: innovative teaching materials, Integration of digital tools into technical education and developing a Digital Public Infrastructure for Education through data capture, analysis and information exchange which would be readily available.

Professor Akinwande said CODAPNU united all Directors of Academic Planning of Nigerian Universities with a view to enhance effective and efficient academic planning functions in Nigerian Universities.

She highlighted some of its objectives to include: Promotion of academic excellence in teaching, research and community service activities of the University; Development and strengthening of the knowledge, skills and expertise of Academic Planners in Nigerian Universities; and Serving as liaison with and advising the National Universities Commission on all matters relating to Academic Planning in the University.

Delivering a keynote address titled "Strategic Planning for Sustainable Development in the Nigerian University System: An overview," Professor Hafiz Abubakar, advised that Universities must take precautionary measures like strengthening on-line teaching and learning so that any future pandemic as witnessed during COVID-19 would not obstruct university academic planning.

He submitted that Sustainable development in Nigerian universities demanded a comprehensive and integrated approach that involves all stakeholders.

He suggested regular reviews and adjustments to the strategic plan and to ensure its alignment with emerging trends, technological advancements, and changing

needs, enabling universities to serve as role models for sustainable practices while nurturing future generations equipped to address global challenges.

In another presentation titled, Resource Verification of Programmes: Any Need for Review of Parametres in line with CCMAS, by Professor Yahuza Bello, he pointed out that it would take some years before programme accreditation could be conducted based on CCMAS.

As a result, he noted that it was pertinent for NUC to, as soon as possible, put in place a mechanism for revising the Manual with a view to identifying areas requiring changes.

He submitted that Resource Verification was more urgent as all new programmes to be introduced from now on were expected to use the CCMAS curriculum.

The Guest Speaker added that there was, therefore, an urgent need for decisions to be made concerning how proposed new programmes were to address the 30% local contribution, while any decision to be taken required wide publicity to guide the universities.

He argued that as the engine rooms and focal points of accreditation and resource verification exercises, Directors of Academic Planning should lead the way by assisting NUC in devising the way forward, describing the CODAPNU as a first step, towards actualising that success.

The DES Academics, Dr. Saliu, whose presentation dwelt on "Orientation of New Directors of Academic Planning of Nigerian Universities," said NUC had over the years relied on the strong relationship it had built over the years with the Directors of Academic Planning of Nigerian universities.

He acknowledged that the DAPs would continue to be relevant to the operations of NUC and in indeed of their respective universities. He informed the DAPs about NUC's expectations on them, stressing that their positive responses to these expectations would continue to make the difference in the Nigerian University System (NUS).

There was also presentation by the Former Secretary General (CVC), Professor Michael Faborode on "The CCMAS, Accreditation/Quality Assurance and Enhanced Global Ranking of Nigerian Universities."

A major highlight of the event was the conferment of award of excellence on distinguished academics that had contributed to the overall development of the NUS that included: Vice-Chancellor, NOUN, Professor Olufemi Peters, represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Academics, Professor Chiedu Mafiana as well as the DVC Teaching, Innovation and Research of NOUN, Professor Godwin Akper.

COMMUNIQUE OF THE 17TH CONFERENCE AND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF COMMITTEE OF DIRECTORS OF ACADEMIC PLANNING OF NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES (CODAPNU) HELD ON 10TH - 13TH DECEMBER 2023 AT NATIONAL OPEN UNIVERSITY OF NIGERIA (NOUN) MODEL STUDY CENTRE, ABUJA, NIGERIA

Theme: Strategic Planning for Sustainable Development in the Nigerian University System

There are a total of 270 Universities in Nigeria, (61 Federal, 63 State and 146 Private Universities). The number is smaller than what obtains in countries with similar populations and good funding.

Universities have significant role and contribution to the overall sustainable development of a nation. There is need for development and implementation of a robust strategic plan to enable impactful contribution of universities to sustainable development requirements. The impactful contribution of universities to sustainable development requirements of universities to sustainable development and implementation of a robust strategic plan.

Universities must take precautionary measures like strengthening online teaching and learning so that any future pandemic will not obstruct university academic planning. These include but not limited to:

i. Use of radio and television stations as part of means of the delivery of teaching and learning especially where internet services could be an obstacle;

ii. Building capacity of

academic and allied staff in using technology in teaching and learning;

iii. Provision of online computer training for students, which should preferably start from the first year of study;

iv. Prioritizing e-teaching and e-learning in the strategic plan and ensuring implementation; and

v. Finding creative and innovative solutions to online teaching and learning.

Lack of sound strategic plan is the most critical of all the challenges that confront University education system in Nigeria. Way forward includes effective strategic planning towards the provision of effective leadership and quality teaching and learning, generation and utilization of adequate resources, fighting academic corruption and fraud, improvement of research output and impact, attraction of international students. rebranding Nigerian Universities, and provision of adequate infrastructural facilities.

Sustainable development in Nigerian universities demands a comprehensive and integrated

approach that involves all stakeholders. Regular reviews and adjustments of the strategic plan is important to ensure its alignment with emerging trends, technological advancements, and changing needs, enabling universities to serve as role models for sustainable practices while nurturing future generations equipped to address global challenges.

Directors of Academic Planning (DAPs), being the liaison between the National Universities Commission (NUC) and their universities, are very relevant to the operations of NUC. They need to continuously update the institutional data most especially for the purpose of annual collation of university statistics across the nation.

Development and update on 'Academic Brief' is important to be done by the University. It is important to continuously organize training workshop for Directorate of Academic Planning of Nigerian Universities.

According to the CCMAS, there should be an established mechanism to enable students to evaluate courses delivered to

them at the end of each semester. This should be an integral component of the course credit system to serve as an opportunity for feedback on the effectiveness of course delivery. Such evaluation should be undertaken by students at the end of each course. this may be one of the parameters to be used by panels for CCMAS-based accreditation.

Periodic 'Quality Assurance' of the university system is important to enable provision of graduates that can complete globally.

CCMAS is a thought in the right direction to place the Nigerian Universities in the global competitive market. Nigeria graduates will be relevant and compete globally. Research and collaboration components that impact on the needs of the society and ranking will take Nigerian university to excellence.

A 21st Century University has to be globally competitive, locally relevant by impacting live and livelihood (SDGs and African Agenda 2063), 21st Century/4IR compliant, entrepreneurial, and with other key indices (quality teaching, research excellence, societal impact, and stakeholders'/admirers' perception). Impact of CCMAS in programme accreditation is to be felt in about five years for programmes with Full Accreditation status and in about three to four years for newly established programmes. There is an urgent need for decisions to be made concerning how proposed new programmes are to address the 30% local contribution.

Effects of CCMAS on accreditation is mostly on four main parameters of accreditation which are: i. Academic matters (especially curriculum, course evaluation and student's course assessment. and evaluation of student's skills); ii. Staffing; iii. Physical facilities; and iv. Library

resources. 'Manual of Accreditation' developed by NUC in 1989 and revised in 1999, 2012, and 2020 respectively needs to be revised in relation to CCMAS and with reintroduction of preaccreditation training of Panel Chairmen.

It is important that DAPs are involved in resource verification and accreditation exercises as an opportunity to garner experience. However, such involvement must not clash with when same DAPs are having simultaneous exercise in their universities.

NUC needs to address the issue of multiple programme accreditation by professional Councils based on the huge financial implication on Universities.

Conclusion:

The Conference underscored the significance of strategic planning, sustainability, and quality assurance in Nigerian universities. The recommendations are poised to address challenges and enhance the effective implementation of CCMAS, reflecting a commitment to the continuous improvement of the Nigerian University System.

RE: ABOUT 100 FAKE PROFESSORS JUST UNCOVERED IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES – NUC A REBUTTAL

The attention of the National Universities Commission (NUC) has been drawn to news items, circulating on the social media, some national dailies and television stations, to the effect that the Commission has just "discovered over 100 fake Professors in Nigerian Universities". The NUC wishes to deny these media reports categorically and unequivocally. They are fake, untrue and a figment of the imagination of the author(s), all happening at an unsuitable time, when the nation is awaiting the outcome of the investigation into the fake certificate saga from universities in some neighbouring countries. The Commission therefore finds this development as unfair to all stakeholders.

Specifically, the fake news items have been circulating in two forms – (i) as a link to a 2019 online news item; and (ii) as a separate list of names of the alleged fake Professors in various Nigerian Universities, which was not the case. We consider these unfounded publications as ill-conceived and a ploy by unscrupulous persons to create in plausible a tone, disquiet, panic and provoking outcries at both the national and international levels.

For the avoidance of doubt, the Commission can confirm that it initiated in 2019 a laudable project, with the intent of compiling and publishing a list of full Professors in the Nigerian Universities System (NUS) through the use of an online portal to collate the requisite data. During the exercise, the NUC found anomalies, such as Associate Professors being listed as full Professors. It is essential to also state clearly that the Commission as a responsible Federal Government Agency, does not engage in half-baked exercises capable of tarnishing the image of Nigeria and the NUS. That was why the Commission deemed it necessary to share the collated data with the Nigerian Universities for the purpose of authentication by the competent authourities as to who qualifies to be a full professor. Based on the verified data, the Commission then in a landmark accomplishment, first published the list of full Professors who participated in the exercise in 2019. It was understood that this

would be succeeded by a continuous process of updating the list of full Professors. It is important to state at this point that all the issues pertaining to the 2019 verification of full Professors in Nigerian Universities were concluded in 2019. Since then, the Commission has entrenched a more reliable system of generating the list of full Professors in the NUS. The Commission is also conscious of the fact that some of the academics not captured in the 2019 exercise may now have matured and progressed to become full Professors; this being the reason why it continuously updates the list of full Professors in the NUS.

The National Universities Commission questions the rationale behind recycling this stale 2019 news of an activity it initiated, conducted and laid to rest in the same year. The purpose and objective of resurrecting in 2024 (more than 4 years later) this-no-longer-fresh news, is clearly intended to generate unnecessary controversy at an unsuitable time, whilst lacing it with a false list of fake Professors.

The National Universities Commission owes it a solemn duty to protect and guard the integrity of the many hardworking and committed academics in the NUS, who have earned national and international respect and recognition. Therefore, the Commission has been saddled with the vital and strategic responsibility by its enabling laws, to uphold the sanctity of quality in all aspects of our University Education delivery.

The Commission wishes to use this medium to advise Government officials at all levels, members of the NUS, the international community, and the public, to please disregard these items of fake and stale news which have long been laid to rest in 2019. Press Release SUSPENSION OF EVALUATION AND ACCREDITATION OF DEGREE CERTIFICATES FROM THE BENIN AND TOGO REPUBLICS.

The attention of the Federal Ministry of Education has been drawn to the commendable work of investigative journalism that led to the publication by the Daily Nigerian Newspaper dated 30th December 2023 titled "UNDERCOVER: How DAILY NIGERIAN reporter bagged Cotonou varsity degree in 6 weeks, participated in NYSC scheme". This was also carried in various social media.

2. This report lends credence to suspicions that some Nigerians deploy nefarious means and unconscionable methods to get a Degree with the end objective of getting graduate job opportunities for which they are not qualified.

3. The Federal Ministry of Education vehemently decries such acts and with effect from 2nd January 2024 is suspending evaluation and accreditation of degree certificates from Benin and Togo Republics pending the outcome of an investigation that would involve the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Nigeria and the two countries, the ministries responsible for Education in the two countries as well the Department of State Security Services (DSSS), and the National Youths Service Corps (NYSC). The Ministry therefore wish to call on the General Public to support its efforts, show understanding and provide useful information that will assist the Committee in finding lasting solutions in order to prevent further occurrence.

4. The Ministry has also commenced internal administrative processes to determine the culpability or otherwise of her staff for which applicable Public Service Rules would be applied. 5. The issue of degree mills institutions, i.e institutions that exist on paper or operate in clandestine manner outside the control of regulators is a global problem that all countries grapple with. FME has been contending with the problem including illegal institutions located abroad or at home preying on unsuspecting, innocent Nigerians and some desperate Nigerians who deliberately patronize such outlets. Periodically, warnings have been issued by the Ministry and NUC against the resort to such institutions and in some instances, reports made to security agencies to clamp down on the perpetrators. The ministry will continue to review its strategy to plug any loopholes, processes and procedures and deal decisively with any conniving officials.

6. The Ministry had always adopted the global standard for evaluation and accreditation of certificates of all forms which relies on receipt of the list of accredited courses and schools in all countries of the World.

7. The Ministry wishes to assure Nigerians and the general public that, it is already putting in place mechanisms to sanitise the education sector, including dissuading the quest for degree certificates (locally or from foreign countries) through a re-invigorated focus on inclusivity: reliance on all skill sets as directed by President Bola Ahmed Tinubu GCFR.

8. The Federal Ministry of Education is committed to collaborating with stakeholders, including civil society organizations, to consistently enhance the Nigerian education system and we value the public's understanding and patience as we strive to address these issues.

9. The Federal Ministry of Education wishes all Nigerians a happy new year. A year in which we would all work together to strengthen our education sector.
